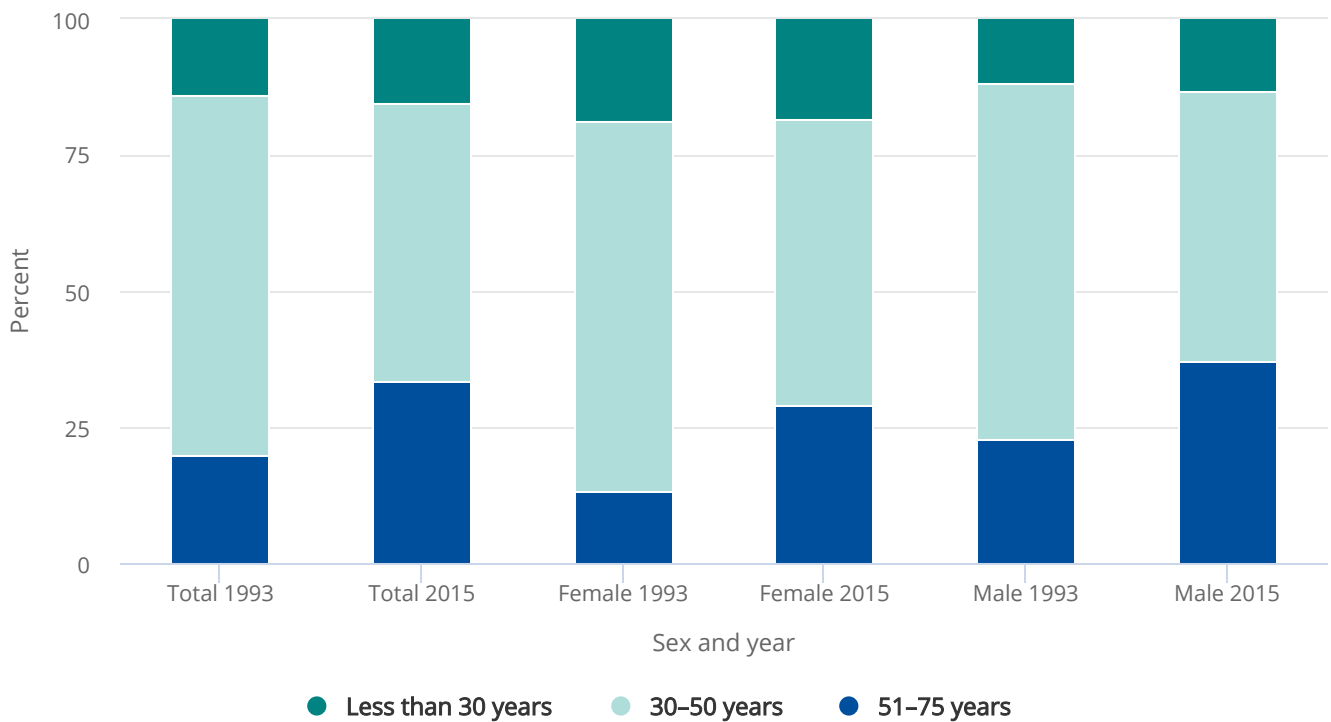

**Note(s)**

For 1993 data, scientists and engineers include those with one or more S&E degrees at the bachelor's level or higher or those who have only a non-S&E degree at the bachelor's level or higher and are employed in an S&E occupation. For 2015 data, scientists and engineers include those with one or more S&E or S&E-related degrees at the bachelor's level or higher or those who have only a non-S&E degree at the bachelor's level or higher and are employed in an S&E or S&E-related occupation. The Scientists and Engineers Statistical Data System (SESTAT) and the National Survey of College Graduates (NSCG) do not cover scientists and engineers over age 75.
